

The University of Alabama has so much to offer to its students. Sitting









The Robert E. Witt Student Activity Center sits on the north side of campus overlooking the Black Warrior River. As UA's newest recerational facility, it boasts a modern design with floor-to-ceiling windows, a convenience store and smoothie shop. The 85,000-square-foot building includes:

- Climbing wall with lead and belay climbing and bouldering
- Three studios for Group Exercise class and personal training
- Cardio area with 80 machines and equipment
- Weight room with 80 pieces of strength training equipment
- Two volleyball and basketball courts
- One multi-use court for floor hockey and indoor soccer

The Aquatic Center is located near Coleman Coliseum on the south side of campus. It houses The University of Alabama Swimming and Diving team, which practices in an Olympic-size pool with diving platforms. Students can take advantage of the Aquatic Center's other amenities, such as:

8-lane, 25-yard pool in the Natatorium (available in the morning and evening during non-practice hours)

3,000-square-foot weight room, complete with free weights, machines and other equipment

Multi-purpose room for Group Exercise classes offered by University Recreation

- Aquatics classes such as swim lessons and lifeguard, CPR/AED, first aid and water safety instructor trainings


The Student Recreation Center is the main location for all things exercise. It is located on the east side of campus near the Rhoads Softball Stadium. The SRC also houses Intramural Sports, Outdoor Recreation, Sports Clubs and Draver Physical Therapy. Here are some of the SRC's services:

- Cardio Area with exercise machines and equipment for many different exercises
- Weight room
- Studios for Group Exercise, personal training and combative arts
- Outdoor fields for Sports Clubs and outdoor Intramural Sports
- Outdoor and indoor pool complexes
- Tennis, basketball and racquetball courts
- Bouldering-focused climbing wall



ABOUT IT Follow these tips and tackle buying textbooks like a pro

Buying textbooks is one of the most important parts of the beginning of a new year. This process can be stressful, confusing and of course, expensive, but handling everything in an effective way can help any student come out of the experience stress-free.

For the early starters or curiously prepared, the Supe Store's website has a feature where students can look up their courses and see what materials will be required for the class. The store offers online ordering as well, allowing students to order their books in advance and have them delivered to their homes over the summer.

2. The Supe Store offers an option to rent textbooks instead of buying them. Renting books is often cheaper and reduces clutter at the end of the year. Just make sure to remember the return date; returning books late can cost you.

3. There are often used textbooks available to buy at a discounted price at the Supe Store. As long as you do not mind a few notes sprinkled throughout the passages, it is easy to get a used book that is in almost-new condition. Not to mention, it saves money.

The Supe Store offers a buyback program at the end of the year where students can return their non-rented textbooks for cash. You likely will not get the full value that you paid, but this program definitely comes in handy when May rolls around and your Dining Dollars balance is almost gone. **5** Before you wait in line at the Supe Store, there are online third-party sellers like Amazon or Chegg that may have the books you need available for sale. The store can sometimes run out of stock, so third-party sellers can be a quicker (and sometimes cheaper) alternative.

6 In order to avoid stress and save time, do not go buy textbooks the minute you walk out of your first class on August 22. The Supe Store becomes crowded very quickly and the stacks of textbooks cannot accommodate every student. Wait until the next week of school to go buy so the lines are shorter and you have a better opportunity to take your time.

Always look up a textbook by its course or ISBN. Textbooks come in many different editions – sometimes with the same titile and cover – professors may require a specific edition. Save the time returning books and take your time to do it right the first time.

Use your textbooks! Attending The University of Alabama is quite an investment, including buying textbooks. So, do your grades a favor and be sure to complete the readings required by your classes. Your GPA will thank you.

There are two locations of the Supe Store, including the main one on the first floor of the Ferguson Student Center, and the Corner store — located near Tutwiler Hall on Bryant Drive. 

Four food service apps save students time, money

Hooked

Hooked is an app that offers deals on local eats. All students have to do is download the app, search deals at nearby restaurants, claim the deal, then show their phone to the cashier or server at that restaurant. Boom - money saved. Hooked changes deals frequently, so checking it often is important. Also, Hooked places time limits on its deals, so students must be sure to claim the offer before the clock runs out. This is an easy way to try new restaurants around town and save money at the same time.

Crimson2Go

Crimson 2 Go is an app and website that focuses on allowing the user to order delivery from local restaurants. The service eliminates the need for unnecessary trips to restaurants such as Ajian, Chuy's and Frutta Bowls, as Crimson 2 Go drivers will deliver right to a dorm. An extensive list of restaurants Crimson 2 Go can access is found by searching www.crimson2go.com. Disclaimer: Users should take note that there is a delivery fee proportional to the number of miles from the restaurant to the delivery location.

Ugo

Ugo Convenience Delivery, a local service created in Tuscaloosa, is a delivery app that makes various services available for students. The app not only covers food orders, but it also allows users to arrange deliveries for electronic accessories, home supplies and other necessities. In effect, the application serves as a portable convenience store (minus the gas). Also, as a late-night service, Ugo provides the opportunity for students to access supplies and snacks without having to go to Walmart or the gas station.


Tapingo

Tapingo allows users to skip lines altogether by submitting their orders in advance. The app becomes useful if a student is on a tight schedule and requires food at a quicker pace. For example, a student can order Starbucks while in class, then run by the Ferguson Center and instantly pick it up on the way to their next class. Tapingo also provides the option to have food delivered directly to users. With Tapingo, students don't have to worry about being at the mercy of lines or location, helping them stay on top of busy schedules.







Get the best game day experience with these tips

Football reigns supreme at The University of Alabama, so it's no surprise that game days are more of an event rather than just a few hours of your day. A lot goes into preparing for an Alabama football game in terms of what to wear, stadium rules and how UA students spend their football Saturdays. These are some things to consider before walking into Bryant-Denny stadium.

WHAT TO WEAR:

Contrary to other schools, students at UA typically get dressed up for sporting events, especially football. Clothes always include the theme of crimson, white, houndstooth or all three. Guys tend to wear button downs or collared shirts paired with khaki shorts and loafers or tennis shoes. Girls often sport dresses and skirts representing Alabama's colors and may wear cowgirl boots or comfortable shoes with a bit of height. However, getting dressed up certainly isn't a requirement and a lot of students opt to wear Alabama t-shirts or anything displaying the colors crimson and white. Buttons of all kinds pinned to shirts, purses and backpacks are other common items you'll see students wearing. With Alabama heat and lots of walking the most important thing to wear is something comfortable.

WHAT TO BRING:

Your ACT Card is the one item you cannot forget on game day. This holds your ticket and gives you access into the stadium. Along with their card, students often carry shakers, a small purse and a bottled water around before entering the stadium.

STADIUM RULES:

When you are finally ready to enter Bryant-Denny, there are a few rules to remember so you can enjoy your experience without any trouble. One of these is the clear bag rule, which states bags brought into the stadium must be clear, vinyl or PVC. Small "clutch" purses and wallets are also permitted as long as the item does not exceed the size of 4 1/2" by 6 1/2". Items such as fanny packs, backpacks and large cases or bags are not allowed. Other permitted items include umbrellas, outside food and drink, and noise makers such as horns or cow bells. One more item to note is the addition of metal detectors, which patrons are required to walk through starting in the 2018 football season.


HOW TO SPEND YOUR DAY:

Whether you have tickets to the game or not, plenty of activities surround campus and offer different ways to spend your day. About an

hour prior to kickoff, the Million Dollar Band performs on the steps of Gorgas Library and makes its way to Bryant-Denny in a tradition named The Elephant Stomp. Another tradition worthy of checking out is the Walk of Champions. A few hours before the game, the Alabama football team is dropped off from its buses and continues along the walk in front of the stadium leading to Bryant Denny. If you prefer to watch the game in a cool area, the Ferguson Center displays games in its theater located on the second floor. Swiping your ACT Card provides entrance into the theater. Restaurants such as Buffalo Phil's and The Grill are also popular spots on The Strip where you can enjoy the general atmosphere of game day while eating wings and cheese fries.

GETTING THE MOST OUT OF YOUR GAME DAY EXPERIENCE:

In order to make the most out of your game day, here are a few general points to note. Student gates open up 2 ½ hours prior to kickoff. Seating in the student section fills up quickly, so the earlier you arrive the better chance you have at getting a good spot. Also, check your tickets to see if you are seated in the upper or lower bowl. As the lines are typically long it's important to know this ahead



of time so you wait in the correct spot. If you own a car on campus, it's imperative to check your crimson email ahead of a home game to find out parking information. Most of the time, you will be required to move your vehicle to a different location as to not be towed on Saturday. Along with these points, remember that with the number of people on campus cell service is very poor so always stick together with friends and family. The best places to communicate via cell phone include the Ferguson Center or Starbucks on Paul W. Bryant Drive.

Every football Saturday is filled with tradition and lively energy circulating around campus. Knowing just a few things helps to make game days memorable and fun!





Standout players to watch in UA's 2018-19 seasons

Women's Volleyball **Hayley McSparin**

Hayley McSparin followed up her freshman All-SEC campaign in impressive fashion last year, recording 273 kills, third most on the team. In the season opener against Cleveland State, McSparin notched a career-high 22 kills. Not only did McSparin rack up kills in bunches, but she did so effectively, boasting a .301 hitting percentage. Expect McSparin to be a crucial piece of Alabama's attack this season.



Gymnastics Lexi Graber

It didn't take long for Lexi Graber to earn a spot in the Crimson Tide's rotation during her first year on campus. In addition to recording an impressive regular season, Graber cemented her place on the SEC All-Freshman team by winning the all-around competition at the NCAA Tuscaloosa Regional with a career-best 39.575. With Alabama losing several key seniors, Graber's already sizeable role should only grow this season.

Soccer **Abbie Boswell**

An All-SEC Second Team selection last year, senior Abbie Boswell was responsible for a huge chunk of Alabama's offense, leading the team in goals (eight), shots (51) and shots on goal (23). Boswell's eight goals were good for eighth in the SEC. This season, Boswell will be charged with spearheading an offensive attack composed of promising young players.

Men's Tennis Mazen Osama

After a stellar junior season in which he became the first Ålabama player to advance to the Round of 16 and quarterfinals in the NCAA Singles Tournament, Osama also became the team's first First-Team All-American since 2001. Osama finished the year at No. 8 in the Oracle/ITA Rankings with an 18-8 overall record. All eyes will be on the Cairo, Egypt native this season to see if he can top last year's unprecedented success.

Baseball Sam Finnerty

With coach Brad Bohannon looking for improvement in his second campaign, he will be relying on another strong season from right-handed pitcher Sam Finnerty. Finnerty committed to pitching full-time last season. Sporting a 4.45 ERA, Finnerty was the Crimson Tide's Friday night starter and tied for the team lead with four wins as a junior. He pitched a team-high 87 innings and allowed 14 walks.

Rowing **Makena Clark**

Senior Makena Clark began her Alabama rowing career as a walk-on. Last season, the Los Gatos, California native competed in the Crimson Tide's top boat (First Varsity 8+). Clark helped Alabama to a third place finish in the Women's Collegiate 8+ and second in the Women's Collegiate 4+ of the Chattanooga Head Race. Clark will again be called on to lead Alabama's top boat this season.

Men's Basketball **Tevin Mack**

Replacing the production of No. 8 overall draft pick Collin Sexton will prove difficult. Never mind the loss of transfer Braxton Key. Enter Tevin Mack, a 6-foot-6 wing who sat out last season after transferring from Texas, where he led the Longhorns in scoring in 2016-17 with 14.8 points per game. Mack's offense will be a needed addition to a team with NCAA tournament expectations.



Not only was Davis Riley Alabama's top golfer last fall, he was the top-ranked collegiate golfer in the country. Although Riley cooled off in the spring, he still finished the season ranked No. 22 after leading the Crimson Tide in top-five finishes (four) and rounds of par or lower (23). With fellow All-American Lee Hodges having graduated, Riley will have to shoulder an even bigger



Women's Basketball **Cierra Johnson**

Cierra Johnson, who transfered to Alabama after an impressive two-year run at Shelton State Community College, will have an immediate impact for the Crimson Tide. Johnson was named the 2017-18 NJCAA Division One Women's Basketball Player of the Year after averaging 22 points, 4.8 rebounds and 4.1 assists per game. Starting at point guard for the Lady Bucs, Johnson scored a record 153 points in the national tournament last year.

Men's Swimming & Diving Zane Waddell

Zane Waddell earned a place on Alabama's NCAA championships squad after becoming an SEC Champion for the Crimson Tide's 200 freestyle relay team. Waddell finished third in the SEC with a career-best 45.83 100 backstroke time, which ranks him third all-time at Alabama. Waddell found the podium again at SECs as part of the Crimson Tide's 400 medley relay (3rd) and 400 freestyle relay (3rd).

Women's Swimming & Diving Leonie Kullmann

Leonie Kullmann, the Dresden, Germany native set an Alabama record in the 200 and 500 freestyles en route to winning the B final of the SEC Championships last season. Her terrific performance earned her a spot on Alabama's NCAA Championship squad, which finished 30th in the country. Expect Kullmann to continue breaking school records, some of which may be her own, as her Alabama career unfolds.

Women's Track & Field **Stacey Destin**

High jumper Stacey Destin racked up accolades for her impressive 2017-18 season. The junior from Boynton Beach. Florida, finished sixth in the high jump at the Indoor NCAA Championships, earning First-Team All-American honors for the second year in a row. Destin is Alabama's school record-holder in the indoor high jump with a clearance of 6-2 3/4 and the pentathlon with 4,186 points.

Softball **Kaylee Tow**

In her first year on campus, Kaylee Tow was both one of Alabama's most consistent and most effective players. The Madisonville, Kentucky native started and played in 55 games at outfield for the Crimson Tide, knocking in 31 RBIs and hitting 11 home runs, good for third and second on the team, respectively. Tow's impressive season earned her a spot on first team All-SEC.

Men's Track & Field, Cross Country: **Gilbert Kigen**


Gilbert Kigen transferred to Alabama from Central Arizona College where he was the most decorated junior college runner in NJCAA history. Kigen's success in the junior college ranks immediately translated to Division I when he joined the Crimson Tide in 2017. Last year, Kigen received Firstand Second-Team All-American honors in the 10,000 and 5,000 meters, respectively. Kigen was given All-American honors in cross country after finishing fourth at the 2017 NCAA Championships.



Women's Tennis **Andie Daniell**

During her Alabama career, senior Andie Daniell has done it all. Since joining the Crimson Tide as the nation's thirdranked recruit, Daniell has amassed a singles record of 62-31 and a doubles record of 53-45. Daniell received first team All-SEC honors while being named to the 2018 SEC Community Service Team. Praised by coach Jenny Mainz as one of the hardest workers she has ever coached. Daniell could have an even better season this year.

Lauren Stephenson A First-Team All-SEC honoree, Lauren

Stephenson led her team to within one hole of a national championship in 2018. Stephenson, who was one of 12 women's collegiate golfers named to the 2018 U.S. Palmer Cup team, was awarded the Golfstat Cup as the nation's leading scorer with a school-record 69.76 average. On top of Stephenson's other accolades, the senior was named Golfweek Magazine's 2017-18 Player of the Year.

TEVITA MUSIKA

Before transferring to Alabama as a part of the 2018 class, Tevita Musika wreaked havoc on opposing teams at the College of San Mateo in California. The 6-foot-2, 360pound defensive tackle racked up 42 tackles, 6 sacks and 2 forced fumbles, earning him a first-team California Community College Athletic Association All-American nomination last year. The Crimson Tide will need Musika to provide immediate depth this season after losing Da'Ron Payne, Joshua Frazier and Da'Shawn Hand to the NFL.

JAYLEN WADDLE

Despite losing standout Calvin Ridley to the NFL, Alabama's wide receiver corps is loaded with young talent. The sophomore trio of Jerry Jeudy, Henry Ruggs III and DeVonta Smith - nicknamed the Rugrats - should all contribute this season after logging impressive first years. However, Alabama's wealth of talent at receiver might not be enough to stop freshman Jaylen Waddle from working his way onto the field. At 5-foot-9 and 175 pounds, Waddle possesses elite speed and shifty playmaking ability. The former four-star receiver from the Houston area has potential to be a weapon out of the slot, but could also find the field as a punt returner.

SKYLER DELONG

Following three-time All-SEC punter J.K. Scott is a tall order, but freshman Skyler DeLong looks up to the task. The former Army All-American and No. 2 punter in the class of 2018 had a promising debut in the A-Day game, punting 10 times for an average of 39.4 yards. DeLong also showed the ability to replicate a skill that helped make Scott a two-time Ray Guy award finalist: precision. DeLong pinned the ball inside the 20 six times.

PATRICK SURTAIN JR.

Alabama will field an almost entirely new secondary in 2018 after losing its top six defensive backs to graduation and the NFL.
